## Airmail Rates To Increase

An increase in international surface and airmail rates will take effect Monday, May 1, Postmaster Bill White said this week.

However, he said the new international rates will not apply to mailings for members of the armed forces overseas. These mailings will continue to carry the domestic rate, he said.

Rate increases for both international surface and airmail were first proposed on Jan. 14th and confirmed March 1. They will average about 13 per cent.

Department officials said the rate hikes were needed to offset a deficit of about \$16 million in international mail operations.

The increases are:  
Airmail letters to Central America and the Caribbean area from 13 cents a half ounce to 15 cents.  
Airmail to the remainder of the western hemisphere remains at 15 cents a half ounce except for Canada and Mexico.

Airmail to Europe and the Mediterranean Africa from 15 cent to 20 cents a half ounce.

Airmail letters to the remainder of the world remain unchanged at 25 cents a half ounce.

Aerogrammes and air post cards increased 2c each from 14 to 16c.

Items sent by air, other than letters and parcels, such as small packages, books, periodicals and other printed matter increased 10c per piece to all countries except Canada.

Most letters going by surface transportation to all nations (excluding Canada and Mexico) increased from 11c to 13c. Post cards raised from 7c to 8c.

Most printed matter, including publications, increased one cent a piece. For 2nd class publications to Canada only, the one cent increase will be deferred for 6 months to become effective November 1, 1967. Also, the present bundling rate which permits postage to be computed on the bulk weight of packages of publications addressed to Canadian post offices will remain in effect until November 1, 1968, at which time it will be discontinued.

Surface parcel post rates to all nations increased 20c a parcel, an average of 7 per cent.

"Postage rates for surface first class letters and air letters and surface third class type matter to Canada and Mexico correspond to U. S. domestic rates, which are set by the Congress, and are not being changed at this time," Postmaster White said.

Four persons were hospitalized Friday night in a wreck on US 158 when their car struck a large rock in the highway.

State Highway Patrolman John Pittman said that his investigation showed that Carol Beasley Carter, 52, of Raleigh, N. C. was operating a 1963 Pontiac and was going west on US 158 when his car struck the rock in the road 4-miles east of Mocksville. The car skidded to the left and off the roadway and down an embankment. The accident happened around 9:20 P. M.

Injured were: The driver, Carol Beasley Carter, 52, who suffered lacerations and bruises; Aldos C. Barefoot, Jr., 40, who suffered bruises and other possible injuries; Roy Merwin Carter, 54, who suffered a broken nose and severe facial injuries; Donald Thompson, 45, who suffered a broken back. All were from Raleigh and have been transferred to the N. C. Baptist Hospital.

Damage to the automobile was estimated at in excess of \$800.

NEW YORK, N. Y. — Burlington Industries, Inc., reported consolidated net sales of \$332,627,000 for the quarter ended April 1, 1967, compared to sales of \$355,235,000 for the same period last year.

Net earnings for the quarter were \$12,895,000, equal to 51 cents per share on 25,218,000 shares outstanding at April 1. For the comparable quarter last year, net earnings were \$20,985,000 or 84 cents per share.

For the six months ended April 1, net sales were \$670,064,000 and net earnings were \$29,041,000 or \$1.15 per share. In the comparable six months last year sales totaled \$693,684,000, and earnings were \$40,670,000 or \$1.62 per share.

Charles F. Myers, Jr., president, said earnings in the March quarter were substantially affected by the continued high levels of imports of textile yarns, fabrics and apparel. "Although import controls on cotton textiles and apparel have recently been extended, there are no equivalent limitations on the growing volume of imports of man-made fiber and wool fabrics," he stated. "In these areas, imports are coming primarily from low-wage, highly industrialized countries which frequently subsidize their exports. The industry is making every effort to obtain Government cooperation in holding these imports to more reasonable levels."

Mr. Myers noted that "March quarter earnings were also depressed by the further downward price trend of polyester, acrylic and nylon fibers. This weakness resulted in lower selling prices for fabrics and also required significant inventory write-downs."

"These factors, together with the manufacturing curtailment needed to keep inventories in line with sales, will continue to adversely affect Burlington's operations for the next few months," he added. "It appears, however, that start-up expenses for the record 1966 capital program substantially behind us, the Company is now at the bottom of the decline which began last August."

The Board of Directors, meeting in New York declared a regular quarterly dividend of 30 cents per share, payable June 1, 1967, to shareholders of record at the close of business May 5, 1967.

United States Postal Savings certificates will cease earning interest for depositors on April 27, 1967. Postmaster William C. White said today.

Nationwide, the Post Office Department is holding more than \$90 million in the now obsolete program which was discontinued by the Congress on March 28, 1966.

As of April 27, a year ago, Postal Savings were discontinued, and no deposits were accepted by the Post Office Department. Certificate Office Department, Certificates whose anniversary dates have been reached since last April 26th have earned their final interest payment, Postmaster White said.

On June 30, he said, all remaining funds in the program will be turned over to the Treasury Department to be held in a trust fund until liquidated. There they will remain available for payment without time limitation whenever proper claims are received.

Postmaster White urged that all Postal Savings depositors close out their accounts and invest their funds into United States Savings Bonds or the new Freedom Shares, which on May 1, will pay 4.74 per cent interest.

Holders of Postal Savings certificates can arrange to redeem them simply by applying at the post office where the certificates were issued. The postmaster there, he said, will provide guidance and necessary forms to assist in cashing certificates. All transactions can be handled by mail, and certificates issued to persons now deceased can be cashed by legal heirs in accordance with State laws governing such distributions. Again, the postmaster at the issuance office will render authorized assistance.

## Truck Hits Bridge Rail

MOCKSVILLE — Rain-slick pavement caused a car to skid and a big tractor-trailer to crash into a bridge while trying to miss the car on U. S. 158 near here about 2:30 P. M. Wednesday.

The truck knocked out two sections of the concrete bridge rail on Cedar Creek Bridge 6 miles east of here. The truck then skidded along the bridge and stopped at the end. The wheels and front axle were torn out from under the trailer.

The driver of the truck, Harold Alvin Gibson, and the relief driver, Darrell Doster, both of Winder, Ga., were treated at Davie County Hospital for cuts and bruises, and released. Doster was asleep in a sleeping compartment in the rig at the time of the accident.

Trooper Bill White of the State Highway Patrol said no charges will be preferred.

He said his investigation showed that Miss Margaret Johnson, 40, of 3508 Osborn Road, Greensboro, was passing the tractor-trailer, operated by the Burger King Co. She was driving a 1964 Ford.

White said the car started fish-tailing as it was passing the tractor-trailer, and the tractor-trailer swerved to miss the car, grazed the right side of the car, and hit the bridge rail. Both vehicles were traveling east.

White said Miss Johnson was not speeding. He described the road as "hazardous." She was not injured, but the car was damaged about \$150.

The wreck caused one-way traffic for several hours while two wreckers attempted to get the tractor-trailer into position to be towed away.
