Airmail Rates To Increase

An increase in international surface and airmail rates will take effect Monday, May 1, Postmaster Bill White said this week.

However, he said the new international rates will not apply to mailings for members of the armed forces overseas. These mailings will continue to carry the domestic rate, he said.

he said.

Rate increases for both international surface and airmail
were first proposed on Jan.
14th and confirmed March 1.
They will average about 15
per cent.

Department officials said the rate hikes were needed to off-set a deficit of about \$16 million in international mail

The increases are: Airmail letters to Central America and the Caribbean area from 13 cents a half

ounce to 15 cents.

Airmail to the remainder of the western hemisphere re-mains at 15 cents a half ounce except for Canada and Mexi-

Airmail to Europe and the Mediterranean Africa from 15 cent to 20 cents a half ounce.
Airmail letters to the remainder of the world remain unchanged at 25 cents a half ounce.

Aerogrammes and air post eards increased 2c each from 14s to 12c.

Items sent by air, other than letters and parcels, such as small packages, books, periodicals and other printed matter increased 10c per piece to all countries except Canada.

Most letters going by surface transportation to all nations (excluding Canada and Mexico) increased from 11c to 13c. Post cards raised from 7c to 8c.

To to 8c.

Most printed matter, including publications, increased one cent a piece. For 2nd class publications to Canada only, the one cent increase will be deferred for 6 months to become effective November 1, 1967. Also, the present bundling rate which permits postage to be computed on the bulk weight of peckages of publications addressed to Canadian poet offices will remain in effect until November 1, 1968, at which time it will be discontinued.

"Postage rates for surface first class letters and air letters and surface third class type matter to Canada and Mexico Mexico correspond to U.S. domestic rates, which are set by the Congress, and are not being changed at this time," Postmaster White said.

Net earnings for the quarter were \$12,895,000, equal to 51 cents per share on 25,218,000 shares outstanding at April 1. For the comparable quarter last year, net earnings were \$20,985,000 or 84 cents per share.

For the six months ended April 1, net sales were \$670,-064,000 and net earnings were \$29,041,000 or \$1.15 per share.

\$29,041,000 or \$1.15 per share. In the comparable six months last year sales totaled \$093,-684,000, and earnings were \$40,670,000 or \$1.62 per share. Charles F. Myers, Jr., president, said earnings in the March quarter were substantially affected by the continued high levels of imports of textile yarns, fabrics and apparel. "Although import controls on cotton textiles and apparel have reently been exparel have rcently been etended, there are no equivale tended, there are no equivalent limitations on the growing volume of imports of manmade fiber and wool fabrics," he stated. "In these areas, imports are coming primarily from low-wage, highly industrialized countries which frequently subsidize their exports. these imports to more reason-able levels."
