

Greensboro, N. C., August 1, 1967 -- Burlington Industries has announced that wage in-creases will be made next month by most of its manu-facturing divisions. Charles F. Myers, Jr., pre-

sident of the nation's largest textile firm, said today amounts and effective dates of the increases would be estab-lished on a divisional basis, but, "It looks like most of the moves will be made during September.

The Company, operating in broadly diversified areas of and related products, extiles nas 120 plants in 15 states. Mr. Myers noted that sever al divisions of Burlington had made recent wage adjustments and would not be affected by he broad movement now developing. Because of the diversified and decentralized nature of our operations, wage policy is established at the dirision level," he added. "How-ever, for most of our divisions

the increases will be the fifth in the past four years." The Burlington chief executive said that while the current level of textile business generally is well below that of the past several years, are beginning to note improve-ment in a number of markets and feel that wage rate adjustments are warranted at this time."

Leonard Stein, an official of the company's main offices in Montvale, New Jersey, said last week that the plant itself ripped open. is practically complete, but the installation of equipment and facilities would require another 90 days.

"This is an unusual case in which construction has run well ahead of schedule," Stein "Good weather, plus a Grows Large general lag in industrial construction in other areas, has permitted a concentration of effort here. As a result, the plant is being completed about 60 days sooner than we ex-

"Delivery of the operations equipment has been geared to the construction schedule. Otherwise much of it could have been installed already and we would be about ready to begin manufacturing.

"However, a great deal of interest is being shown in the Mocksville plant, and we expect to have some definite opening plans within another few days."

Approximately 60 will be employed at the start with the number gradually increasing to around 450 over a two-year period. This will make it one of Davie County's largest industries. The Erwin Cotton Mills at Cooleemee now operated by Burlington Industries has about 1,250 employees.

The BVD Co. manufactures a nationally known brand of knit shirt for men, as well as underwear and other knitwear It is understood that most of the employes here will be Wo men.

Construction of the 160.000 square-foot plant, sprawling over four acres of a 150-acre tract, began about the first of the year. The Kahn-Southern Co. of
