

Nurses listen to graduation speech

85 Nurses Graduate Course

Certificates were presented to 85 persons for completing a course for nursing assistants and advanced care of the aged on Sunday, May 3, at the Mocksville School auditorium, by their instructor, Mrs. Alma Anderson.

Mrs. Anderson said:

"The continuing shortage of nursing personnel has created need for a nurses' assistant who is prepared to perform those duties associated with patient care which require only limited nursing service preparation.

"The responsibility of the nursing assistant varies from hospital to hospital and other related institutions caring for the sick. In fact, the only consistent factor in the job description is this lack of conformity. Each nursing service has the responsibility to describe the job and train the workers in its own agency. The procedures selected for inclusion in this course do not attempt to identify what the nursing assistant should do; rather they are only those procedures that have been taught to patients

(so they could help the nurse give each patient the care that

he needed.) In some institutions caring for the sick, nursing assistants may perform skilled nursing procedures, while in another they may only arrange and care for flowers and pass out drinking water".

The Nursing Assistants Class consisted of 100 hours of classroom instruction in addition to laboratory and clinical experiences.

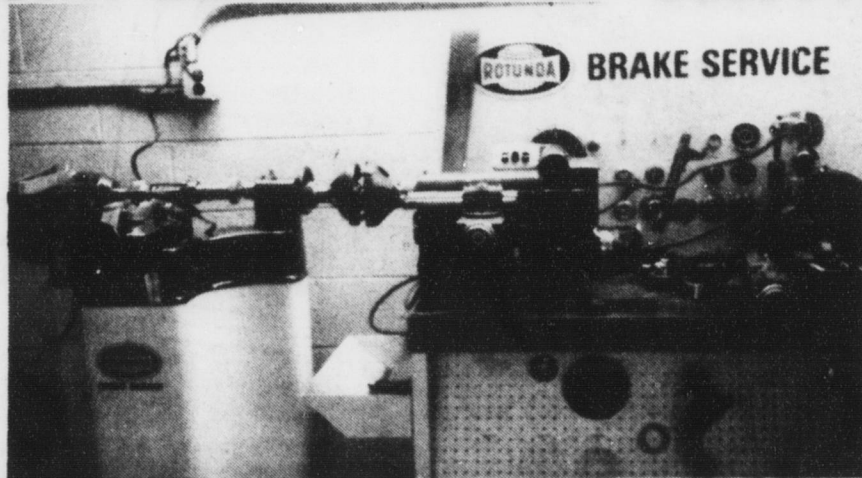
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
