



A survey taken annually to determine the extent to which people have been inoculated against communicable diseases will be made here the week of September 14 by the Bureau of the Census, according to Joseph R. Norwood, Director of the Bureau's regional office in Charlotte.

The immunization survey is part of a national program coordinated by the U.S. Public Health Service. Information on immunization will be collected in conjunction with the Bureau's monthly survey of employment and unemployment for the U.S. Department of Labor which provides a continuing measure of the economic health of the Nation as a whole and of its major regions.
