## DOLL IS OLDEST HUMAN TOY

Plaything of Children Mentioned in the Earliest Historical Records of Antiquity.

The era of reform has reached the doll, than which we can conceive of no better or longer established institution. Dolls were known in ancient Egypt and Asia Minor; the children of Greece and Rome rejoiced in them. The nine-year-old wife of Mahomet is said to have induced her prophet-spouse to join her in play with a favorite doll. The natives of Africa have long cherished them. Cortes found Montezuma and his court amusing themselves with elaborate dolls and the Indians of North America and the Eskimo of Alaska are credited with having possessed this toy from times unknown.

The modern doll of civilization has undergone an interesting evolution, both as to material and construction; but it is only recently that we have witnessed the passing of the expressionless face of waxen beauty and the appearance of what the advertisements call "character dolls." Now we have dolls that are quizzical, dolls that are impertinent. This age-old and universal toy is being humanized. The caricaturist is at work on it, and there is nothing in art more human than the caricature. Even the hands, that so long had but one attitude, are now being made to convey a hint of mood or a suggestion of animation. It is an interesting development of possible psychological significance.
