1915 Cotton Crop Is Least Since 1909

Total of 16,950,000 Bales. Smallest Crop in Six Years—Estimate Declares Crop Is Much Smaller than Forecasted Earlier in The Season.

Washington, D. C.—A heavy decline in the condition of the growing cotton crop almost doubled the average of last season for September, being more than one million bales less than the forecast early in the season.

With a total of 20,750,000 bales equivalent to 592 pounds to the bale, it is the smallest crop since 1909. The condition of the cotton crop on September 25 was 69.5% of the normal with indications the yield will be 300 pounds per acre.
