At Farmville on the 9 11-12 14 16 19 21-22 24 25 26-28 30 31 Days of May, and after the above dates the tax list for this Township will be closed. Attention is also called to the fact, that failing to list will result in your being Double-Taxed as required by Section 30 of the Machinery Act 1911, and the Tax Payer failing to list also subjects himself to a fine under Section 30, Machinery Act.

At Snow Hill on the 10th, Bynum school house May 10th, Lang's school house May 15th, Moriboro May 17th, Mannagans Store May 18th, Healths Store June 1st, Lewis Mill May 29th.

Town taxes will also be listed by me at the same time.
