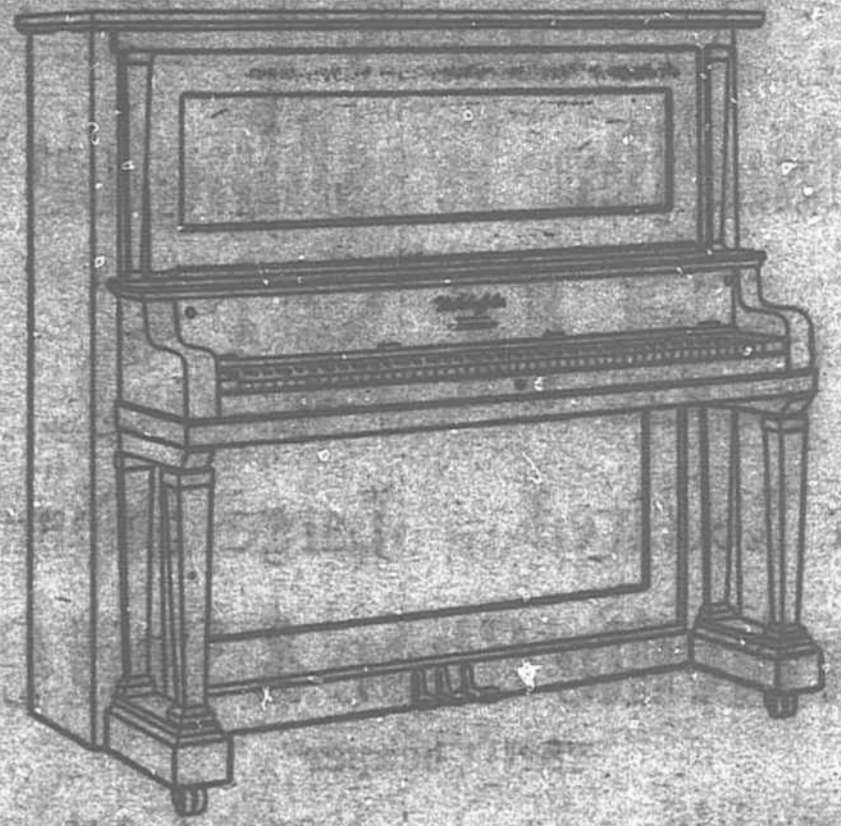
Entertains in Honor of Guests.

or saltier than it. Beer? Oh, maybe two or three glasses a day when I am not bilious. Beer makes me feel bilious. Smoke four or five cigars a day, mild ones.

Aleck will now step over behind the screen and strip. Everything? Yes, R. V. D.'s and all! Certainly. All right—here you are, 500 pounds of guaranteed pure unadulterated flesh. Heart's all right, isn't it?

The heart action is regular. Pulse full. A snapping sound over the aortic area—heart working against heavy resistance somewhere. Aneurysm? Right arteries? Bright? Well, measure Aleck's blood pressure, 180 millimeters. Not so bad for an old fellow of seventy. But Aleck was born only 45 years ago.

We put him through a half minute of calisthenics. Pulse rose up there. Heart action and doesn't slow down.

He looks at the doctor.

Diagnosis: Low specific gravity; an trace of albumin, one lens hyaline cast found in three slides under the microscope. Not significant, only suggestive.

Radial artery rolls palpably under the fingers when the pulse is shut off above the wrist. Aleck is wearing his arteries out fast.

Diagnosis: Incipient hardening of the arteries. Causes: Overeating; moderate use of alcoholic beverages; excessive smoking; inadequate daily exercise.

In other words, the man is about thirty years too old for one of his age. He has lived seventy years in forty-two. He will be lucky to see fifty. It is kept on at this pass. Here is his prescription:

Oxygen, at least a mile twice daily, on the foot. One day a week a diet of plain milk and crackers. Always eat the table not quite satisfied. No alcohol. Not more than two smokes a day. Meat, fish or eggs not more than three meals a week. Cultivate vegetables. Take to the woods ten days twice a year. Open air, exercise and sunlight tend to balance up an unbalanced metabolism.

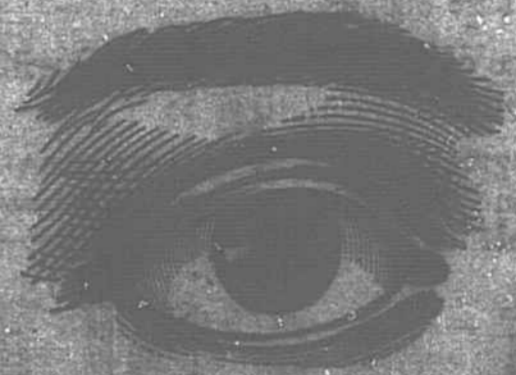
