
Authorizing the Issuance of h\$215,000 Bonds of the Town of Fermville, North Carolina, For Street Improvements.

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Farmville, North Carolina, pursuant to the provisions of Chap ter 56 of the Public Laws of 1915, of North Carolina, as amended, and upon petition made as provided in said act, has determin ed to make or cause to be made the local improvements. hereinafter described, and to specially assess two-thirds of the cost thereof upon lands abotting di rectly on the improvements, ex clussive of the cost of paving at street intersections, and exclusive of the cost of work to be done by ralroad companies (which latter cost is to be special ly assessed against such railroad compaties unless such work is done by them), as provided in said act; and





One half of the consumers of meat live in the East.
