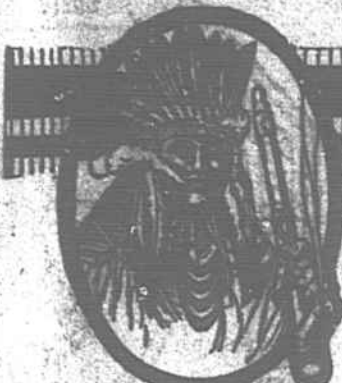
They will be at home in Kenley, N. C., where Mr. Capps is junior partner of the Capps Motor Co.

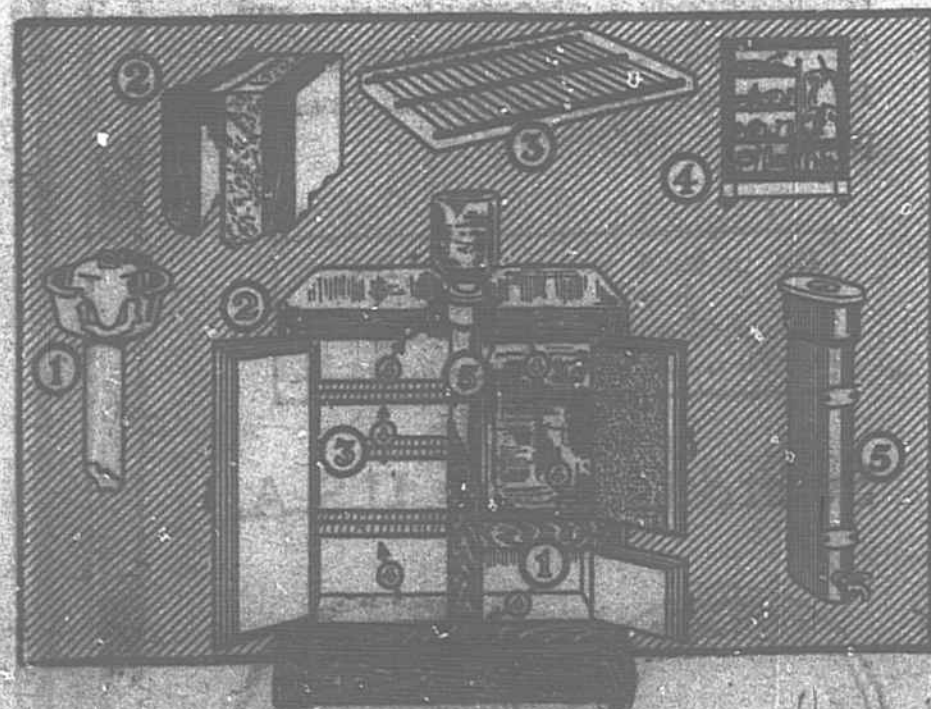
