

## BRIDE APPEARS IN SHOCKING ATTIRE

PRIEST HAS LIGHTS PUT OUT AND SENDS BRIDE HOME TO PUT ON MORE CLOTHES.

## WOULD BE IN SOCIETY STYLE

Because of the Order of the Priest the Performance of the Wedding Ceremony Was Greatly Delayed.

New Orleans.—A wedding ceremony in St. Louis cathedral was postponed several hours because the officiating priest, Father Antoine, of the Order of Oblate Fathers of Mary Immaculate, declared the bride was immodestly attired.

The priest declared the bride appeared to him "so shocking that he had the organ put out the lights so that she might retire and properly clothe herself."

Although he declined to divulge the name of the bride, he declared she "wanted to fly in society style at her wedding, much to her disgrace."

The bride started up the main aisle but had not gone far before the priest threw the gown she wore, ordered the lights out and sent her home to assume other garments. The marriage ceremony was then performed.

St. Louis.—A campaign for enactment of uniform automobile laws in all the states was authorized at a meeting here of the board of directors of the National Automobile Dealers Association.

## The Famous German Raider Ship, Prinz Friedrich Offered for Sale

Washington.—One of the famous German commerce raiders, the Prinz Friedrich, which took refuge in Hampton Roads during the war, is to be offered for sale.

## Credit of Chicago With Bankers Extended at Least for a Time

Chicago.—James H. Pogue, chairman of the Chicago Clearing House, notified the city that a request for a \$15,000,000 loan had been refused by Chicago banks and that no more money would be loaned to the city at this time.

## President of Mine Workers in a Speech Denies Government of Kansas

Montreal.—Richard Hewitt, president of the Kansas district of the United Mine Workers, in an address here before the American Federation of Labor convention, denied Governor Hin to enforce his court of industrial relations as which he "attempted to ride into the White House."

## Joint Effort is Being Made to Relieve Congestion of Freight

Washington.—Department of justice and interstate commerce commission officials began working together to relieve freight congestion on the nation's railroads and to restore coastwise shipping to normal through settlement of strikes of marine workers.

## Chinese Troops Attack American Mission and Kill the Missionary

Peking.—The American legation here was informed that General Chang Ching-Yao's northern troops in their retreat from Chang-Sha, capital of the Ku-Man province, attacked the Reformed church mission at Yo-Chow, 50 miles north of Chang-Sha, and killed the Rev. Mr. W. A. Belmont.

## General Aguilar, Son-in-Law of Carranza, Quits Soil of Mexico

Notice City.—General Aguilar, former governor of the state of Vera Cruz, and son-in-law of the late President Carranza, has embarked on the steamer Yuma at Vera Cruz to leave Mexico.

On the eve of his departure, he issued a statement saying that when the political passions of the country are cooled, he will be ready to be judged before any tribunal, as an ex-Confederate soldier or a politician.

## American Federation of Labor Wants Exclusion of Japanese

Montreal.—The American Federation of Labor in convention here called upon the congress to file United States to demand the "unconditional" exclusion of Japanese and absolutely prohibit Japanese and other Asiatic immigration into this country. The resolution of "white slaves" also was adopted.

Sealed proposals will be received by the Board of Commissioners of the County of Pitt, North Carolina, in the office of the Clerk of said Board, at Greenville, North Carolina, on Monday July 5, 1920, at 2 o'clock P. M. when they will be publicly opened for the purchase of \$100,000 School Bonds of Special School Tax District No. 3, in the Township of Farmville, County of Pitt, North Carolina, of the denomination of \$1,000 each, numbered from 1 to 100 inclusive, bearing interest at the rate of six per centum (6 per cent) per annum, payable semi-annually dated May 1, 1920, and maturing as follows: \$3,000 on May 1st in each of the years of 1921-1930 inclusive, \$4,000 on May 1st in each of the years 1931-1940, inclusive, \$3,000 in each of the years 1941-1950, inclusive. Said bonds will be coupon bonds, with the privilege of conversion into fully registered bonds.

Proposals must be enclosed in a sealed envelope marked on the outside, "Proposals for Bonds" and addressed to J. C. Gaskins, Clerk of the Board of Commissioners of Pitt county, North Carolina. Bidders must deposit with said Clerk before making their bids, or present with their bids, a certified check drawn to the order of the Special School Tax District No. 3, Farmville Township, Pitt County, N. C. Upon an incorporated bank or trust Company, or a sum equal to two per centum of the face amount of bonds bid for, to secure the municipality against any loss resulting from the failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of his bid. The purchasers must pay accrued interest from date of the bonds to the date of delivery. The bonds cannot be sold at less than par and accrued interest.

Successful bidders will be furnished with the opinion of Messrs. Reed, Dougherty & Hoyt of New York City, that the bonds are valid and binding obligations of said Special District No. 3, of Farmville Township. The bonds will be prepared under the supervision of the United States Mortgage & Trust Company, New York City, which will certify as the genuineness of the officials and the fact of their appointment.
