**JUDGE HORTON MAKES
SPLENDID IMPRESSION**

Fayetteville, Nov. 27.—A one-week term of Cumberland superior court for the trial of criminal cases adjourned at noon today, after Judge J. Loyd Horton had cleaned up the docket of 105 cases in five and a half days. Judge Horton is filling out the unexpired term of Judge Gatton and is perhaps the youngest jurist in the State, but the record he made here in the dispatch of business is one of the most remarkable achieved by any superior court judge in the Cumberland court. This will be the last, as it was the first, court to be held here by Judge Horton, and the Cumberland bar met at close of the session and passed strong resolutions of commendation and appreciation of his work as a presiding officer.
