DON'T TRUST THE SOCK

There are still many people around Farmville who put their money away in an old sock or the sugar bowl, and refuse to trust it to Uncle Sam or a good, solid banking institution. We read recently where a man had lost his straw hat—and \$75 stored away inside the hat band. Another man gave a bootblack a pair of shoes to shine—and too late remembered that he had stuffed \$200.00 in the toe of the shoes for safe-keeping. And every day we read of money stolen from its hiding place under the rug or mattress—the first place a burglar looks for valuables. But some people simply can not profit by these examples; they can't bring themselves to realize that nothing in all the world is as safe and secure as Liberty bonds and war savings stamps, and that bank failures are almost unheard of in this country anymore. We're sorry for these kind of people—the kind who are afraid to trust their fellowman. We are sorry for anyone who loses sleep—and the man who can't trust his money into the keeping of others usually loses more or less sleep for fear someone will walk away with the sugar bowl or the sock.

BETWEEN YOU AND ME

The other day I heard a man ranting around because his child had been punished in school. So far as I know they may have grounds for complaint.

The thought that struck me, this was this: "Just who is he doing the greater injury to, the teacher, the child, or himself?"

One thing is certain, if he talks in the presence of the child the way he talked when I heard him, he is injuring all concerned much worse than he is the teacher.

In the first place the parent has no right to speak disparagingly of the child's instructor in the presence of that child. The reason for this is apparent, or should be to any parent who will give it a thought. If a teacher is to help a child get the best out of school, that child must have a good opinion of the teacher. The teacher may be disliked by the child, but dislike does not mean disrespect.

Without the respect of his pupils, a teacher will not accomplish very much for the good of the child.

What that parent should have done—well, he is not the kind that can keep still until he cools off.

I imagine that is one of the

greatest injustices accorded a teacher—illtimed and abusive criticisms.

A teacher asked me recently what I would do under certain conditions, if a certain thing came to my home.

"Between you and me," I'll tell you what happened to me when I was a kid and these things came about. Every time I was punished at school, I was punished at home. Sometimes I felt it very unjust, and probably my parents did too, but they felt that the moral effect was more to be desired.

I have thought that a good plan to follow up with my own family, and my children will tell you that it has worked out very well, even to this generation.

I have been very angry at what I considered an injustice done by a teacher, but have always kept my own counsel until an opportune time. We, you and I, owe it to our children to give the teachers every aid within our power in their work. No greater help can be given the child than that which we give the teacher. It will reflect in the after years of the child. It means either that the child will be resentful, to some extent, or that it will not be resentful and will be thorough in all things undertaken.

Don't you think so.
