FIREMAN RETURN FROM MOREHEAD

Report Most Successful and Interesting State Convention Ever Attended.

Firemen attending the North Carolina State Convention in session at Morehead City this week as delegates from the Farmville Fire Department returned Thursday night with renewed energy and determination, stating Farmville would be in the race next year when the Convention meets in Durham. Again North Carolina made a World's record in speed, both in chemicals and water, exceeding the record made by this convention last year by several points. Statesville captured the prize with chemicals, the time being 8.35 seconds, while High Point won out with water in 9.25 seconds. The run being a hundred yards in both instances.

Farmville, however, failed to get in on either of these contests this year, but hopes to give other towns a good race for honors at the next Convention.
