Honor Not All Gutenberg's
 Printing is said to have been in-
 troduced to the world Aug. 24, 1437. John
 Gutenberg stands at the head of the
 early typographers, supported by the
 genius of Schoeffer and the generous
 patronage of Faust. Gutenberg used
 only blocks, and to Schoeffer is due
 the movable type cast from matrices.
 Caxton, who introduced the art into
 England, began life as a trader, but
 learned printing at Cologne. The first
 printed book on record is "The Pray-
 er," which John Faust and Schoeffer
 published at Metz in 1457.

Tree Trunks Made Cisterns
 The gigantic baobab tree of central
 Africa, the trunk of which sometimes
 attains a diameter of forty feet, often
 serves as a natural cistern, retaining
 rain-water in large quantities in a
 cavity formed at the top of the broad
 trunk. Taking the hint thus afforded
 by nature, the Arabs artificially hollow
 out the huge baobabs and fill them
 with water during the prevalence of
 rains, as a provision against the dry
 season. These cisterns are in many
 cases twenty feet in height and eight
 or ten feet in diameter.
