The ceremony was performed in the Methodist parsonage with Rev. B. T. Candler officiating, using the beautiful and impressive ring ceremony.

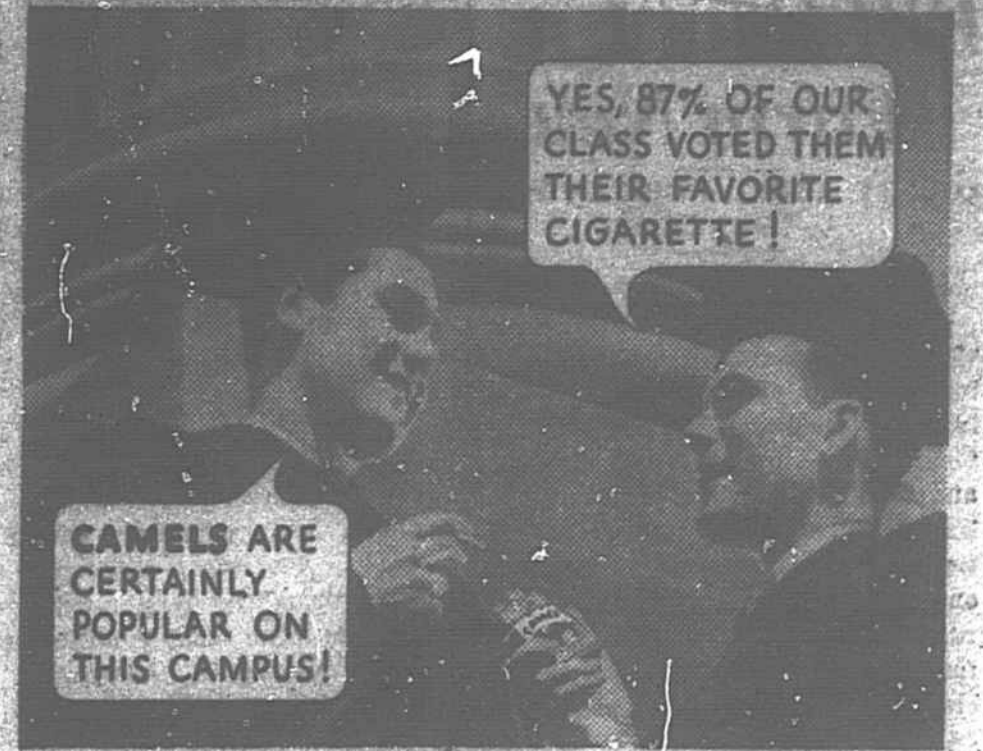
The bride, an attractive blonde, was becomingly attired and was lovely in a traveling ensemble of navy blue tulle sheer crepe with corresponding blue accessories.
