**"GOING PLACES" IN THE AIR.**

Early this month, seventeen naval flying planes completed a non-stop flight from San Diego, California, to Honolulu, Hawaii, a distance of 2,570 miles, in seventeen hours and twenty-one minutes.

So far as we know, the flight was a routine transfer in the Navy, and attracted very little attention in the United States. It should convince anyone that the flying age is at hand.
