The Corn Belt, from Ohio west through Kans and the Dakotas, reported 795 locker plants, of which Iowa had 305 units, the largest number for any State. Ranking high al-Kinley and being re-elected for four so is the Pacific Northwest, where Washington had 225 units, the second largest number. Other states where the lockers have become popular included Minnesota with 114; Nebraska, 92; Kansas, 90; Oregon, 75; Wisconsin, 65; Idaho, 50; Illinois, 46; Oklahoma, 42; and South Dakota, 25, Many new plants are proposed or are under construction.

1938 MILK RECORD


A new high record of milk production in 1938 about 110 billion pounds for the full year-is indicated by the last monthly estimates of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics. The increase over 1937 is about 4 per cent. Butter is the most important man-

ufactured product, using about 41 per cent of the total milk production. An equivalent amount is used as milk and cream. Cheese takes about six per cent of the milk, evaporated milk case goods about 4 per cent, ice cream about 3.5 per cent and a number of other products the remainder.
