Carolina Trailways Announces A New Thru Bus Service

Carolina Trailways is today announcing a new through bus service between Richmond, Virginia, and Farmville, N. C., and Jacksonville, N. C., with no change of bus enroute. This will enable passengers in this territory to travel to any point between Jacksonville, N. C., and Richmond, Va., without having to change buses at any point.

At the same time this through service is being announced, Carolina Trailways is putting into service an additional round trip between Kingston, N. C., and Richmond, Va. This trip will also operate without change of bus.

On this service Carolina Trailways will use the new Trailways Clipper Coach on every schedule. These coaches have won a very distinctive name for themselves because they are so comfortable and quiet.

This new service will leave Farmville, northbound, at 10:05 A. M., 12:50 P. M., 5:20 P. M., and will leave Farmville, southbound, 10:00 A. M., 12:50 P. M., 6:00 P. M.

This greatly improved bus service should be of great value to citizens in eastern North Carolina as it will tie these sections much closer together than has ever been possible in the past. It will enable citizens in eastern North Carolina to travel to Virginia points and return home on the same day. It will also enable Virginia citizens to travel to points in eastern North Carolina and return in the same day.

Through connection at Kingston the Rocky Mount territory is brought much closer to the beach at Morehead City, as the running time is much shorter than heretofore.

The same courteous Trailways operators will serve on this new service and will welcome all of their old friends as well as the new.

This improved service makes it much more convenient to reach the World's Fair in New York, which is much larger and better than it was last year.
