"Making both ends meet is a real life problem for all of us. Grace Lewis, Farmville High School, helped solve this problem for her family by assuming responsibility for the conservation of surplus foods on the farm last summer. She is a member of a family of ten. Her mother has many responsibilities, which she shares with the children. Especially since Mr. Lewis' death all members of the family have worked closely together for the good of each one. Grace made her contribution through her home economics work in high school by selecting food preservation for a home project. With the help of her mother, her home economics teacher, and State and Federal Government bulletins, she canned several hundred jars of fruits, vegetables, jelly, and preserves. 
