PRISONERS

The prison population of the United States consists of about 66,000 persons, according to estimates based on data from 108 prisons and reformatories in 46 states and in eighteen Federal institutions. Among the prisoners, 94.9 per cent are men and 5.1 per cent are women. The medium age of the felony male prisoners is 27.6 years and of women 29.2. Of the felony prisoners, 68.8 per cept are native-born whites, 26.3 are Negroes, 3,8 are foreign-born whites and 1.1 per cent are classified as of "other races."

BRITISH CASH

A r-eliminary examination of Britain's financial condition, made by U. S. Treasury experts, establishes the fact that the British will run out of cash to pay for purchases of arms and munitions in this country "in the yields," Mr. Piland reports. "Someearly autumn" of 1941. Potash Is Deficient

Farmers are thinking of their 1941 fertilizer needs, and J. R. Piland associate soil chemist of N. C. State College, reminds growers that the majority of North Carolina soils are deficient in potash. This is especially true, he says, in soils where cotton, corn, tobacco, and vegetable crops recommended seem to furnish suffiof the Coastal Plain are grown.

"In the fertilization of cotton where cotton rust is prevalent, the use of fertilizers containing 5 to 8 percent potash has materially increased side dressing with potash has proved

The chemist says that, in general In Most Soils of State the soils of the Coastal Plain are relatively low in their potash reserves, especially under conditions of inadequate fertilization. Tobacco has high requirement for potash, and usually there is a noted response of the crop to this element with regard to the quality of the leaf produced. The tobacco fertilizer grades now crop in most soils.


