Major Benjamin May Chapter Entertains State Officers

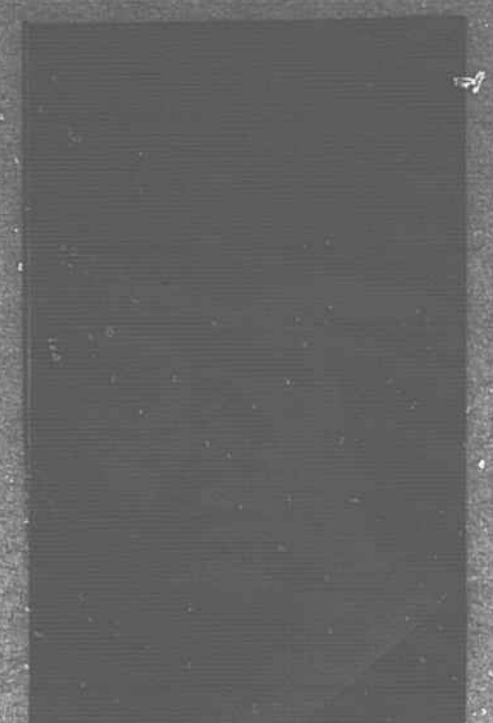
Mrs. J. S. Silverstein, State Regent, and Board Honored At Social Function; Guests Numbering Four Hundred In Attendance.
