#### **BUSINESS PROFITS**

The regular quarterly compilation of business profits, tabulated by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, covers 441 industrial and mercantile corporations.

It reveals that the profits of these concerns, during the first three months of the present year, were 16 per cent above the same period of last year and the highest of any initial quarterly period since 1929.






