Refreshment covers were in Hallowe'en design and in addition to the tournament plates, the hostesses passed salted nuts and mints.

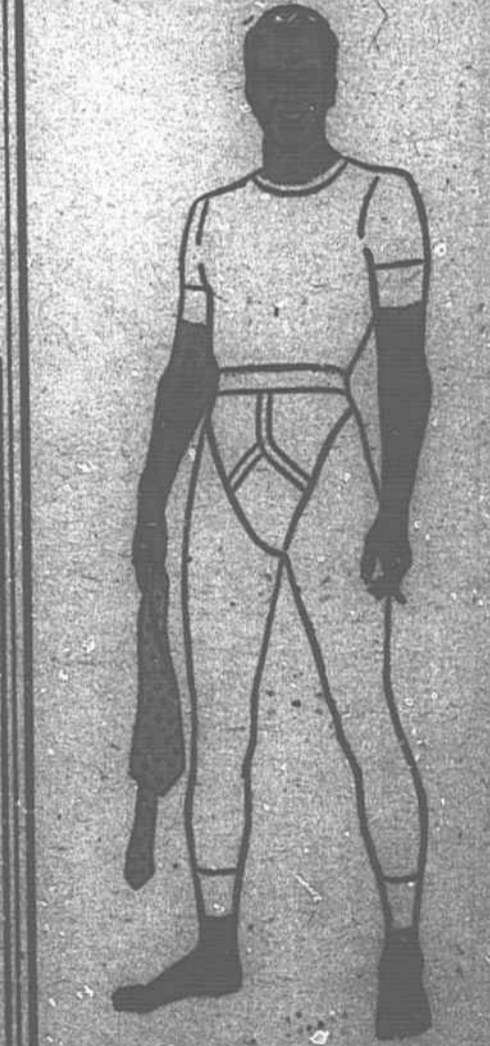

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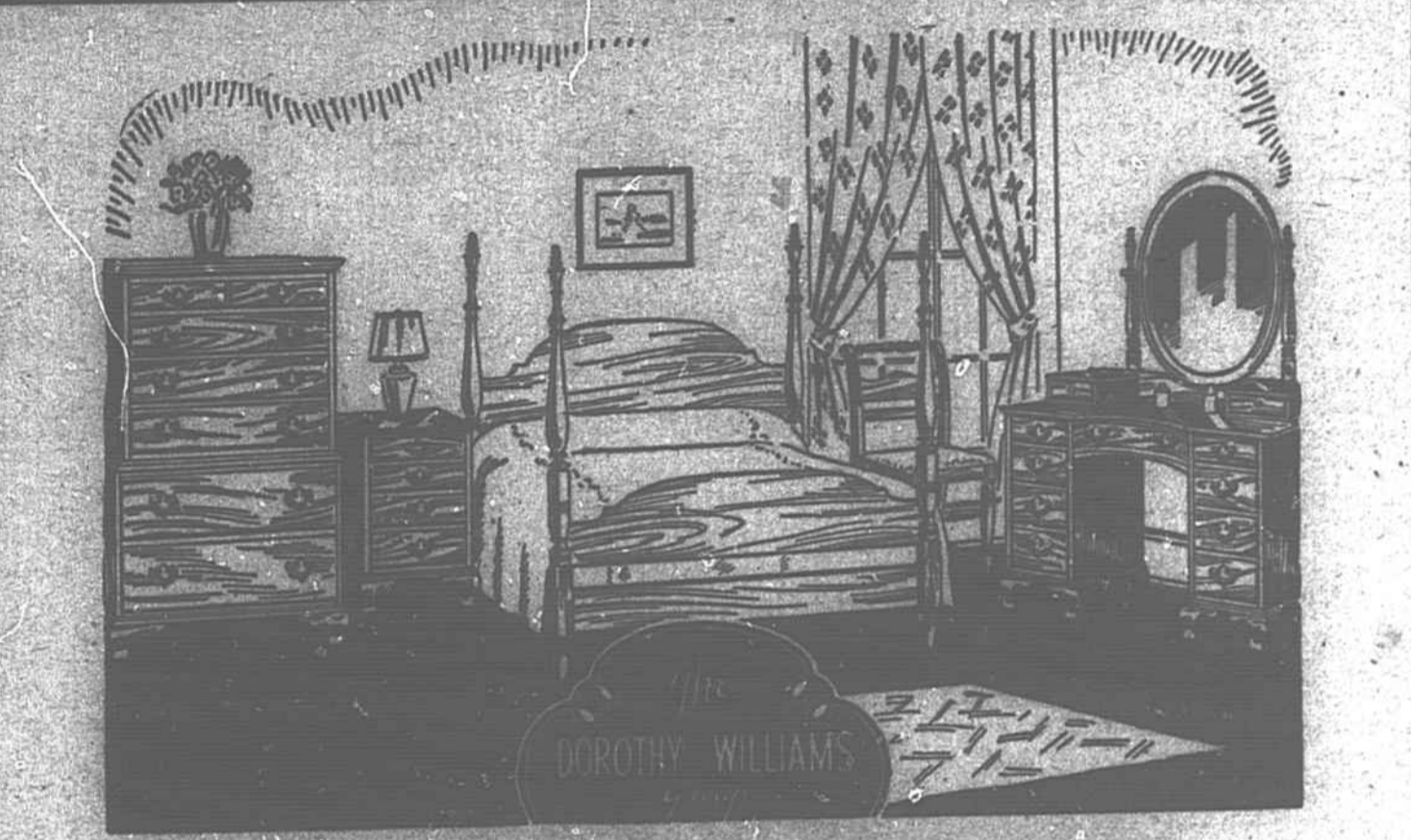

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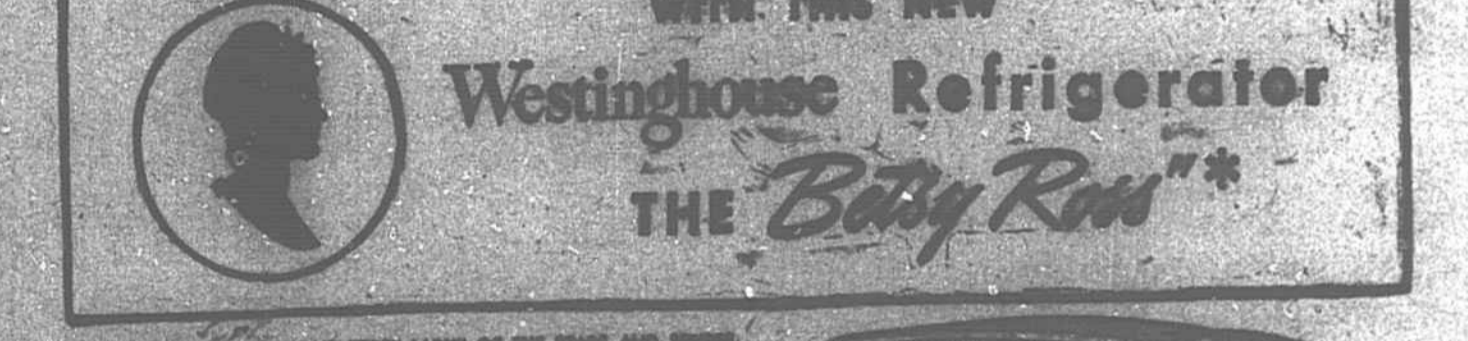
