### Livestock Need A **Good Water Supply**

Dirty water and unsanitary water ing facilities are causing North Carolina livestock producers to lose tens of thousands of dollars each year, says Dr. C. D. Grinnells, veterinario for the Agricultural Experiment Station at State College.

Outbreaks of disease often result from animals drinking from stale summer pends. Even though animals are on clean pasture, drinking water from contaminated lots may easily ad disease germs and par spread disease germs and parasites.
"Plenty of clean water for all farm animals is one of the very best health insurance measures that a farmer can take during the summer months," Grinnells explains.

He suggests good watering troughs that are exposed to the sun, and thoroughly scrubbed at frequent intervals. The troughs should be raised.
