BIRD CLUB At Saturday's meeting of the Bird Club, James Thorne read an article on the Crested Flycatcher, which described it as being eight and one-half inches long; upper parts, olive; underneath gray and white; crown feathers, erectile. The nest is made in tree or stump cavity or woodpecker hole, from six to sixty feet up; is constructed of grass, rootlets, bits of bark, hair and pine needles; remarkable for the fact that it is almost always encircled with a cast off snake skin, probably as a ruse to frighten its enemies from the nest but this is odd as the nest is always placed in a cavity, where there is little light or none at all. No one really knows why this bird follows this peculiar practice so it may be simply a whim or fancy. The food of the Crested Flycatcher shows 94 per cent of animal matter and 6 per cent of vegetable. Beetles constitute one-sixth of its food, such as cottonboll and strawberry weevils and the plum curculio. Bugs constitute 14.26 per cent of the diet such as stinkbugs, tree and leaf hoppers, and cicadas, with a few assassin bugs. Grasshoppers, crickets and katydids seem to be the favorite foods. It is a very desirable bird to have about the orchard or garden since it does not attack any cultivated crop.
