



Industrialization of the South Part I: Prewar Development

THE INDEX

Southern industrial expansion which had been proceeding at a faster pace than in the and other units of its existing industry ... rest of the United States so that today the south, capitalizing upon its vast natural resources, is making rapid progress toward a better balanced economy that will benefit both the region and the Nation.

. . . Throughout the South in recent years new, industries have been emerging and older ones expanding. New rayon mills, chemical ones expanding. New layoutness, pulp and manufacturing establishments, pulp and paper plants, foundries, garment factories, rubber manufacturing plants and many similar establishments have sprung up in the South as the result of its natural advantages.

. . .

Perhaps nowhere else in the United States did wat change the industrial map so much as in the South. In many parts of the region, the industrial development of a generation was telescoped into a few years.

Southern manufacturing facilities were expanded by the expenditure during the period from July, 1940, through May, 1944, of \$4,775 million, of which more than \$1 billion were spent by private enterprise.

Many of the smaller Southern war plants are already being converted to peacetime

Thus, even during the depression of the . 1930's the industrial growth of the South 1930's the industrial growth of the South proceeded vigorously and its dependence upon agriculture as an all-important source of income lessened. When production for national defense became the country's single goal, the South's industrial position, per-centage-wise, was still below that of the country as a whole but its industrial plant country as a whole but its industrial plant was expanding faster than that of the rest. of the Nation and its industry was growing more and more diversified.

Part II: Wartime Expansion production, and the outlook for new facproduction, and the outlook for new fac-tories and the expansion of existing facilities seems bright. Plans have already been re-ported, for example, for a \$6 million pulp mill, a \$2 million paint manufacturing plant, a \$1.5 million power plant and many smaller establishments.

On the whole, the continued industrial development of the South seems naturally and logically indicated. Its wealth of resources, its favorable climate, its ample power supply, and its other advantages may well make this region the new industrial-frontier of the United States.
