BIRD NOTES

The Swallow-tailed Kite is the most graceful in flight of all North American birds. The crown, head and neck and entire underparts are pure snowy white. The back, wings and tail are glossy-black with varying, principally violet and greenish-blue. The long wings reach nearly to the tip of the deeply forked tail. The outer tail feathers are about eight inches longer than the middle pair.

The nest, usually in the top of tall trees near water courses, is composed of dry twigs, sticks, hay and moss. The eggs, sometimes four in number, are white, blotched and speckled chiefly around the larger end with rich chestnut-brown and cinnamon.

The Swallow-tail feeds upon snakes, grasshoppers, wasp grubs, caterpillars, lizards, frogs and other small reptiles.
