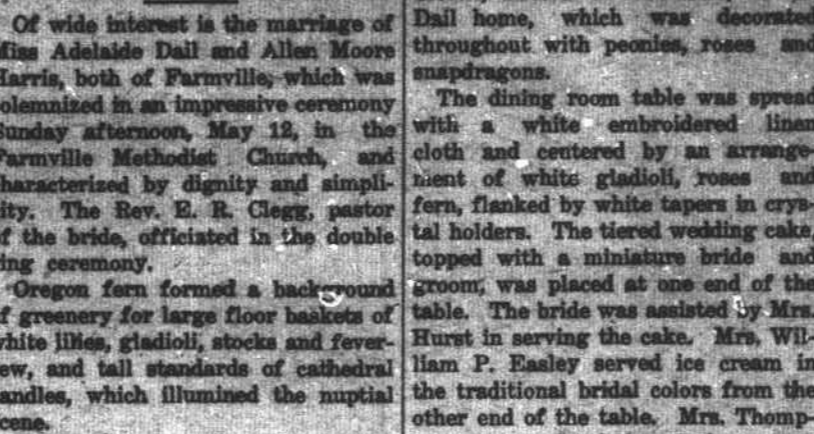
Miss Novie Capps To Marry Ensign Frank M. Adams
