Subgrade Conditioning Material. 45,000 Sq. Yds. Sand Asphalt Pavement. 85,000 Sq. Yds. Bituminous Surface Treatment. 5,000 Lined Feet Storm Drainage, together with necessary Manholes and Catch Basins. CONTRACT 3 4,400 Lined Feet 8" T.C. Pipe. 2,400 Lined Feet 10" T.C. Pipe, Flush Tanks, Manholes, and Water and Sewer House Connections. 3,000 Ft. 6" and 12" B & S Water Pipe with necessary Valves, Specials and Hydrants. 7,000 Ft. 1 1/2" G.I. Water Pipe with Valves and Specials. Plans, Specifications and Contract Documents are on file with the City Clerk at the City Hall, Farmville, N. C.; the office of the Engineer, Greenville, N. C.; the office of the Associated General Contractors, Charlotte, N. C., and Raleigh, N. C. Copies of plans and specifications may be obtained from the Engineer upon the deposit of \$15.00. Deposit will be refunded to those making bona fide bids to the City, and also to those acquiring plans and specifications and who find, upon examining same, that they will not or cannot offer a bid, provided the plans and specifications are returned to the Engineer in good condition on or before the date for receiving bids. Consideration will be given only to bids of contractors who submit evidence showing that they have been licensed under "An Act to Regulate the Practice of General Contracting," ratified by the General Assembly of North Carolina on March 10, 1925 and as subsequently amended. A performance bond will be required equal to 100 per cent of the contract price, conditioned upon the faithful performance of the contract and upon the payment of all persons supplying labor and furnishing materials for the construction of the project. Each proposal shall be accompanied with a deposit of cash or a certified check on some bank or trust company authorized to do business under the laws of the State of North Carolina in an amount equal to not less than than five per cent of the proposal, said check to be made to the Town of Farmville, N. C. as a guarantee

that a contract will be entered into with the Town within ten days after the award to the bidder and that the required bond will be executed. In lieu of a certified check or cash for five per cent of the amount of the bid, the bidder may offer a certified check in an amount equal to two per cent and a bid bond in an amount equal to three per cent of the bid, as a guarantee that the contract will be entered into with the Town within ten days after the award to the bidder and that the required bond will be executed. The Town reserves the right to reject any or all bids or to accept the bid or bids that appear to be to the best interest of the Town.
