NOTICE OF SALE OF BONDS

TOWN OF FARMVILLE NORTH CAROLINA BONDS

Scaled bids will be received until 11 o'clock a. m., E. S. T., August 13, 1946, by the undersigned at its office in the City of Raleigh, N. C., for the following bonds of the Town of Farmville, N. C., dated September 1, 1946, and maturing annually on March 1st, in the years hereinafter stated, without option of prior payment:

\$50,000 Water and Sewer Bonds Maturing annually \$2,000 1948 to 1962 and \$5,000 1963 to 1966, all inclusive.

\$150,000 Street Improvement Bonds maturing annually \$5,000 1948 to 1953, \$9,000 1954 to 1967, all inclusive, \$16,000 1968 and \$20,000 1969 to 1982, inclusive.

Denomination: \$1,000 principal and semiannual interest (M. & S. I.) payable in local money in New York City; general obligations; unlimited tax; coupon bonds registrable as to principal only; delivery at place of purchaser's choice. There will be no auction.

A separate bid for each separate issue (not less than par and accrued interest) is required. Bidders are requested to name the interest rate or rates, not exceeding six per cent in multiples of one-fourth of one per cent. Each bid may name one rate for part of the bonds of either issue (having the earliest maturities) and another rate or rates for the balance, but no bid may name more than three rates for either issue, and each bidder must specify in his bid the amount of bonds of each rate. Each rate must be bid for bonds of consecutive maturities. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder offering to purchase the bonds at the lowest interest cost to the town, such cost to be determined by deducting the total amount of the premium bid from the aggregate amount of interest upon all of the bonds until their respective maturities.

Bids must be enclosed in a sealed envelope marked "Proposal for Bonds" and be accompanied by a certified check upon an incorporated bank or trust company, payable unconditionally to the order of the State Treasurer of North Carolina for \$4,600. The right to reject all bids is reserved. The approving opinion of Messrs. Reed, Hoyt & Washburn, New York City, will be furnished the purchaser.

In the event that prior to the delivery of the bonds the income received by private holders from bonds of the same type and character shall be taxable by the terms of any Federal income tax law, the successful bidder may, at his election, be relieved of his obligations under the contract to purchase the bonds and, in such case, the deposit accompanying his bid will be returned.

Drainage District Election August 12

Monday, Aug. 12, has been fixed as the date of a special election to fill vacancies created by the death of John T. Thorne and the expiration of terms of R. A. Joyner and E. E. Lewis, on the Board of Commissioners for the Pitt County Drainage District Number 1.

Created to supervise the installation of drainage facilities and projects on lands along Contentment Creek, the board's primary function now is to administer the repayment of bonds issued to finance the work and to supervise the maintenance. Most of the bonds have been paid, and the remaining few will become due within the next few years.

Approximately 10 per cent of the assessments is set aside for maintenance.

John B. Lewis serves as secretary of the Commission.

The election will be held in the Municipal Building from 7 A. M. to 7 P. M.

Eligibility is dependent upon ownership of land in the drainage district, with each owner allowed one vote for each acre he has.
