PLENTY OF OIL

(Industrial News Review)

There is a saying that "more oil has been found in the laboratory than by the drill." This simply means that scientific developments in oil conservation and utilization have enormously expanded our present and potential supply.

Every so often, some pessimist "authoritatively" forecasts that in a few years this country's oil reserves will be exhausted. All through the oil industry's 87 years of colorful history such predictions have been proven groundless. Additions to proved reserves have almost always been greater than current production. Further, proved reserves have uniformly turned out to be greater than original estimates indicated. A good example is the great East Texas field, discovered in 1900. It was expected to produce a grand total of 2,000,000,000 barrels. It has already produced more than that—and its remaining reserves are currently estimated at about 3,000,000,000 barrels.
