After some discussion, the Legal Committee was requested to make investigations in regard to building a Legion hut.

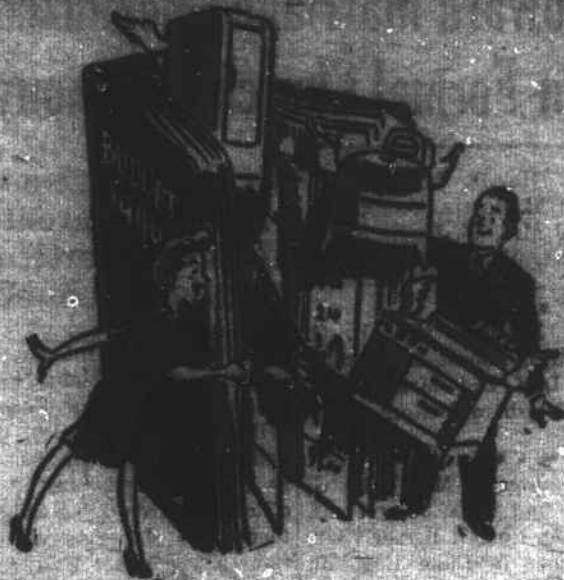
There were twelve new members brought into the post. The meeting was brought to a close by silent prayer.

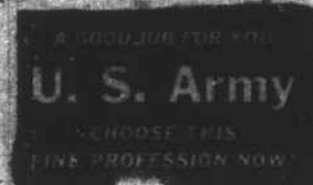
