BIRD CLUB

Bert Barrow Warren read a story about the raven which is also known as the Mexican raven, at the Bird Club, Saturday. Its length is 26 1/2 inches; the plumage is deep glossy black while the under parts are glossier with greenish blue, iris and deep brown.

The tail is much shorter than the long, pointed wings. Often the raven is taken for a crow because it is so similar in many ways, but the deep harsh voice is never mistaken for his crow.

One of the favorite habitats of the raven. In the North Carolina mountains the Northern Ravens are common residents in some sections where they go regularly to rural slaughter pens in quest of food. Its food is almost as varied as that of the crow; yet it is not known to attack cultivated crops of any kind.

Nests are constructed in trees among the evergreen-covered islands off the coast of Maine; strangely, never more than one pair is found on an island. Farther north in Newfoundland and along the Labrador coast, these birds prefer cliffs overlooking the sea as places to establish their residences.

Nests are constructed of large sticks well interlaced. The interior is well lined with coarse grass, bark strips, wool and, in maritime sites, seaweed. The birds are strongly attached to the site, returning year after year.

Eggs, which number from five to seven, are olive drab, profusely spotted and blotched with brown, olive and lavender.
