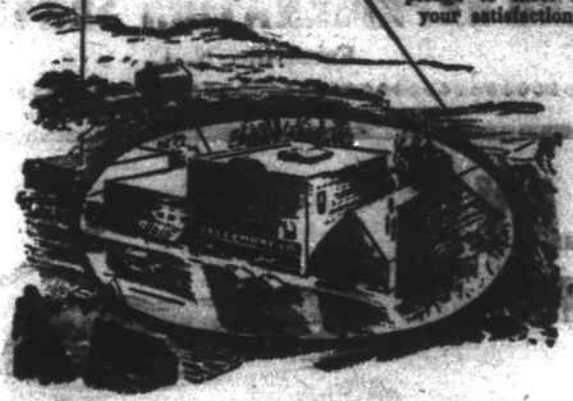

SOCIAL SECURITY ACT TO PROTECT VETERANS

John W. Robertson, Field Assistant of the Rocky Mount Field Office of the Social Security Administration, who spent Friday in Farmville, said that the recent amendments to the Old-Age and Survivors Insurance provisions of the Social Security Act, were designed to protect veterans and their families.

In commenting on the amendments, Mr. Robertson said that the amendments to Old-Age and Survivors Insurance provisions of the Social Security Act, which were enacted by Congress in August, 1946, mean that thousands of veterans who otherwise had no protection under the Old-Age and Survivors Insurance law are now insured for at least 3 years, so now amendments extend insurance protection to those whose jobs (before entering military service) were covered by the law; and now they are assured of financial protection for their dependents until they can re-establish insured status. The amended law also provides social insurance protection for the survivors of some veterans who have never been employed by a business or industrial concern. Under the terms of these new amendments, hundreds of survivors of deceased veterans already have claimed Old-Age and Survivors Insurance benefits.

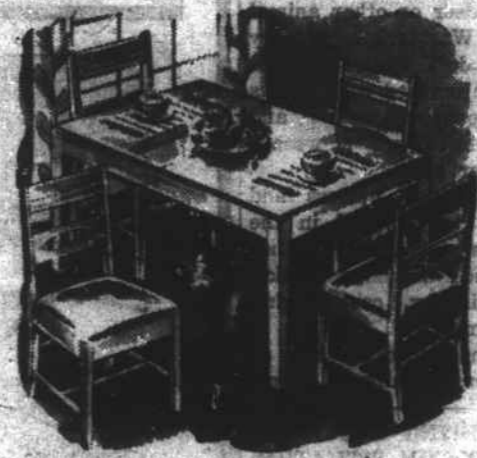

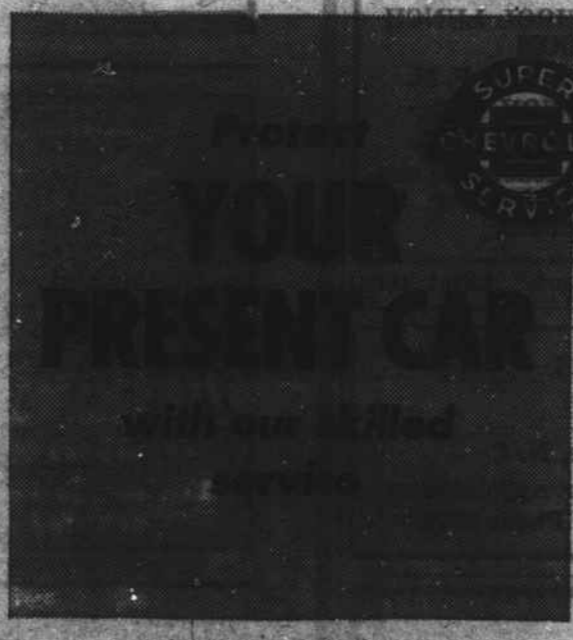
