**Urges Greater Use Of Irish Potatoes**

The total production of Irish potatoes here hit an all time high which means that sagging menus can expect a lift from one of the basic foods. Prof. M. E. Gardner, head of the horticulture Department at State College, in announcing the abundant supply of potatoes produced by growers throughout North Carolina, as well as the entire United States calls attention to the fact that prices of the crop are relatively low and quality high.

Total 1946 production has been estimated at 471,146,630 bushels, which is 46 million bushels greater than the 1945 crop. This yield represents an average production of 167 bushels of potatoes per acre.

The early and intermediate crops of Irish potatoes have already moved to market, Gardner says. It is the late crop, produced largely in the Western part of North Carolina, and of course, throughout many of the Northern states, which is in such abundant supply now.

There is not enough storage space for keeping the entire crop, and for that reason, an increased consumption by the average family will be necessary.

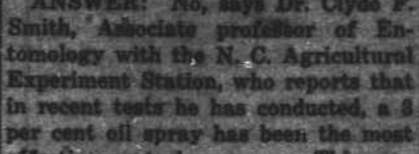
The USDA, the producers, distributors, and the State College Extension Service have joined efforts in this drive to bring the supply to the attention of the buying public.

Gardner points out that the housewife who buys and uses these potatoes liberally is not only preventing food waste at a time when such loss would be unfortunate, but she is also doing her family a favor by using the potatoes in a variety of ways to pick up her dinner menus.

**State College Answers Timely Farm Questions**

**QUESTION:** Is DDT effective against the white peach scale?

**ANSWER:** No, says Dr. Clyde F. Smith, Associate professor of Entomology with the N. C. Agricultural Experiment Station, who reports that in recent tests he has conducted, a 2 per cent oil spray has been the most effective control measure. This material should be used in two applications, spaced about two weeks apart, during the latter part of November or the early part of December. Tests with DDT for the control of this pest have not been satisfactory as with the 2 per cent oil, Dr. Smith says, but further tests are being made with it.



With food generally in short supply, it would be a shame for any of the plentiful crop of Irish potatoes to go to waste, says M. E. Gardner, head of the horticulture department at State College.

**QUESTION:** Have North Carolina's dairy herds been able to maintain their record of freedom from Bang's disease?

**ANSWER:** Yes, says Dr. C. D. Grinnell, veterinarian with the N. C. Agricultural Experiment Station, who gives credit for this fact to the close cooperation that has existed between cattle breeders, the Veterinary Division of the State Department of Agriculture, and the practicing veterinarians. He points out that in spite of the heavy traffic in dairy cattle that took place during the war years, North Carolina's dairy producers were able to maintain their position of complete freedom from Bang's disease—a position which they achieved in 1942. North Carolina has been the only state to reach this freedom.

**QUESTION:** Should I dose my sheep flock with Cu-Nic this winter?

**ANSWER:** Yes, by all means, says the Extension animal husbandry staff at State College, if you suspect the presence of internal parasites in your flock. This treatment should be given about the first of December, the specialists say, and they recommend the following mixture: Dissolve one ounce of copper sulphate (blue stones) in three quarts of water, then add three-fourths of an ounce of 40 percent solution of nicotine sulphate to the solution. This amount will make enough to dose 25 mature sheep. In mixing this solution, they point out that copper sulphate will corrode most metals, so it should be mixed in a glass, porcelain or earthenware receptacle.

**QUESTION:** It's worming time in the peach orchards of the state, says Dr. Clyde F. Smith, Associate professor of entomology at State College.

It doesn't do too much good to kill the rats on your own farm. It's community action that counts. Suggest a county-wide rat eradication campaign.

**Peculiar Soybean Disease Conquered**

The fungus causing soybean purple-seed disease in North Carolina has at last been definitely determined.

Recent studies conducted at the North Carolina Agricultural Experiment Station, under the direction of Dr. S. G. Lehman, professor of plant pathology, have shown conclusively that the blame for this widespread disease of soybeans may be laid on the doorstep of a parasitic fungus with the unpronounceable name of *Cercosporia kikuchii*.

Further tests in which a control measure was sought have revealed that the use of seed treatment dusts, such as Arasan, on the purple stained seeds will help in decreasing seedling losses.

The fungus causing this disease forms spores abundantly on the seedlings that grow from purple stained seeds, Dr. Lehman says. The studies have revealed that it causes infections, that heretofore have not been recognized, on the stems, leaves and pods of these plants.

When seeds that are heavily infected with the disease are planted, germination is often reduced and weak, stunted plants result.

Dr. Lehman says that when seed showing the purple-stained condition are to be planted, treatment is advisable in order to produce healthy plants which will, in turn, produce seed of high quality.
