Prof. R. S. Dearstyne, head of the soultry department at State College, in making this recommendation points out that although a great deal of progress has been made in reducing proodiness in taying hirds, this trait still appears in some chickens, especially in the American breeds.

Because of the frequency of its appearance, the question often arises as to whether or not broody hens are profitable and whether they should be called from laying flocks.

If a high intensity of lay has been bred into the birds, they may have periods of broodiness and still lay profitably, he says. However, from an over-all standpoint in most cases, it would be advantageous to call such hirds from the flock.

ti would be advantageous to cull such birds from the flock.

As a rule, one period of broodiness is usually followed with another, and breaking heas from broodiness requires a great deal of time—more than mers, poultrymen have to spare. Furthermore, Dearstyne says, if birds that show signs of broodiness are used to produce hatching eggs, it is highly probable that the tendency to broodiness will appear in their




