

New Bus Station Opens Here Friday

Farmville's new bus station, located at Main and Belcher streets, will be opened to the public at 10 o'clock Friday morning, according to an announcement made today by M. E. Newton, Superintendent of stations for Carolina Trailways.

This new station will be devoted entirely to the accommodation of bus passengers and their baggage, and proper surroundings and facilities have been provided for their comfort while waiting arrival and departure of buses, Mr. Newton said.

All visitors to the new station on Friday will have a chance to win one of two twenty-five dollar victory bonds which will be given away at five o'clock. All visitors are asked to register their names, so they can be notified by mail if they become winners of the bonds.

The station will be in charge of two experienced Trailways agents—Mrs. Don Cleveland and Miss Carolyn Stephenson, who formerly were ticket agents at Camp Lejeune. They will make Farmville their home, and will assist Farmville bus patrons in planning trips, arranging connections, and provide generally for the travel comfort of all patrons. They will give complete information by phone on all schedules arriving and departing as well as fares to any point.

The opening of this station, and others in this area, is part of an overall plan of the bus company for bringing the people of North Carolina better bus service and station facilities. Because of the lack of building materials and labor the company is taking care now of only those points where stations are most needed, Mr. Newton said.

To most people, the big crimson and cream buses that operate through Farmville are looked upon as "The" bus for Greenville, or Wilson, or at the most, for Raleigh and Charlotte. That's true, because they do go to these places on rather frequent schedules; but the emblem on the side of the buses—a map of the United States with the word Trailways through it, signifies a much bigger operation indeed.

These buses, as well as all buses carrying this emblem and are painted cream and crimson, are operated by Carolina Trailways, just one of the companies called National Trailways Bus System. They operate over 65,000 miles of the highways in the United States, and just recently added member companies that operate in Mexico and Alaska, making it international in scope. This makes it the largest bus transportation system in the United States, and thereby in the world.

Even the passenger who rides only to Greenville and Rocky Mount benefits by such an association, for the

local operators can draw on the experience of all the other companies in operating the same type buses, by safety training on a national scope, and by having special safety and comfort features built into each member-company coaches.

The travels from any distance benefits directly, in that the member companies have worked out, through the national association, joint schedules so that there is no delay in traveling from one region to another. As the postwar fleet of buses is augmented, more "through" buses will be placed in service so that passengers can travel great distances without making a change. Even now, one can travel via Trailways from Wilson to Washington, D. C., without making changes, or from Norfolk to Charlotte.

The new improved bus station, the modern buses coming through Farmville each day, indeed, brings to Farmville the ultimate in modern and economical travel, on a local and national scale.

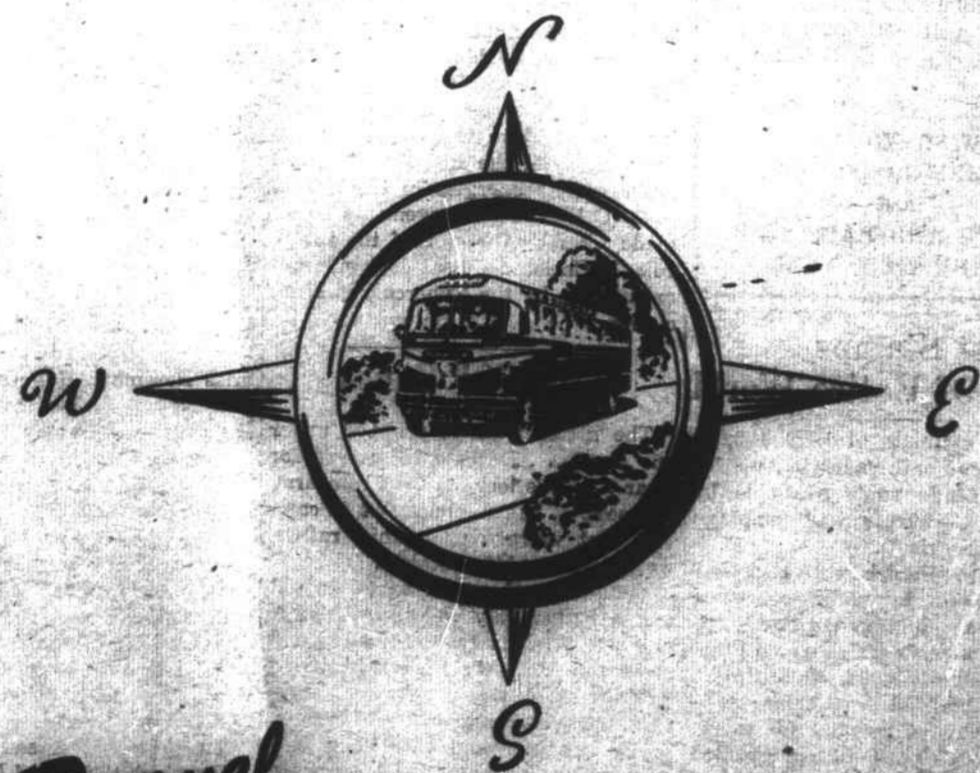

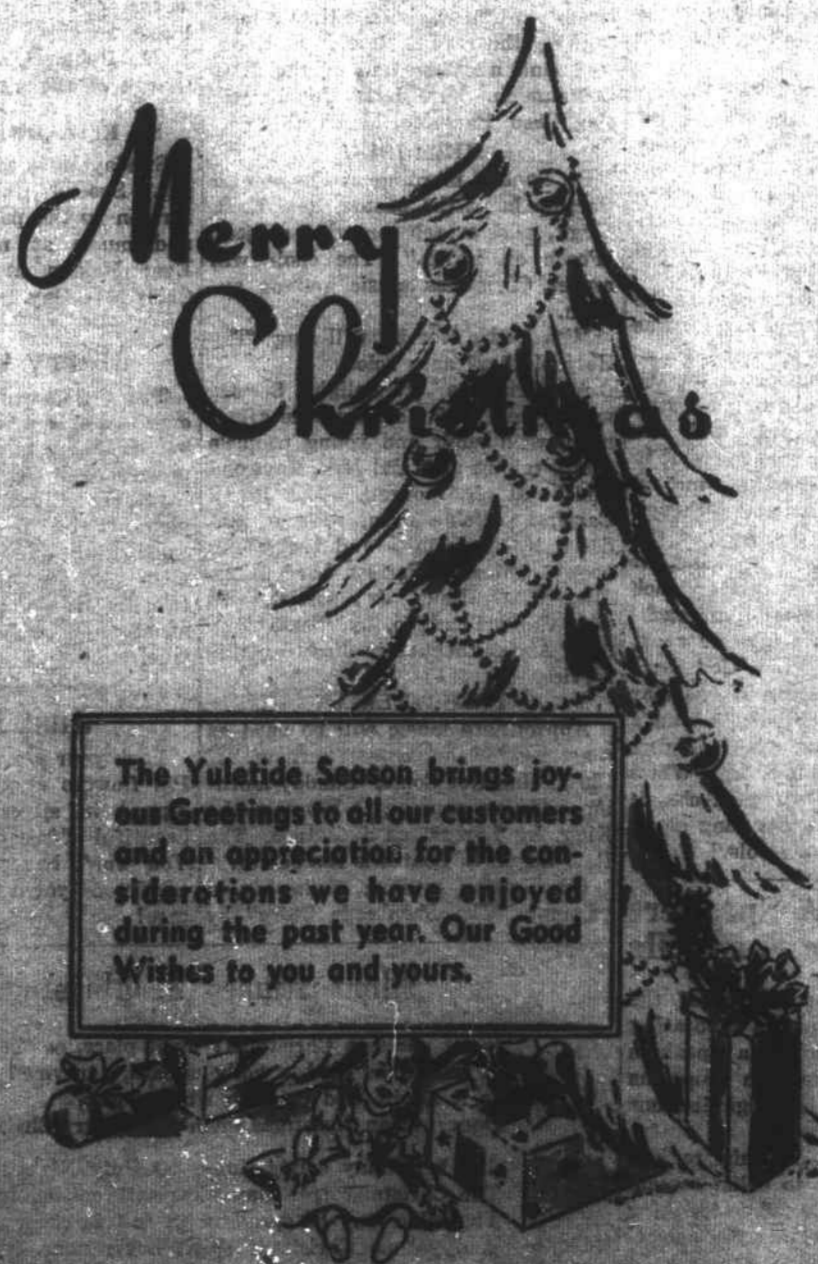

Carolina Trailways Add Ten New Buses

The arrival this week of ten new 41 passenger, air-conditioned "Trailmasters," manufactured by the A. C. F. Brill Motors Company, brings to 25 the number of buses received and put into service on this line this year, according to an announcement made this week by R. C. Hoffman, Jr., president of Carolina Trailways, in Raleigh. Eleven more buses expected before January 1 will swell the fleet to 36.

These buses will be added to the growing fleet of Trailways coaches serving this area, and enable the company to render an improved service to its patrons, said Mr. Hoffman. The delivery of new buses has already begun the retirement of those coaches which have given heavy service through the war period, and the fleet will be further augmented during the coming year.

The new buses represent, in safety, comfort and mechanical performance, the very latest improvements in bus engineering and design. Many improvements, especially in the field of mechanical performance, are the result of knowledge gained by the manufacturer in producing air lines and heavy duty equipment for the armed services. Improved body construction with added interior refinements will result in more passenger comfort, and more successful service will provide a more complete
