State College Hints To Farm Homemakers

To achieve a smooth consistency in some dishes made with milk, adding the ingredients in the right order is an important detail. If added at the wrong time it can cause separation or curdling, cookery scientists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture advise.

When milk is to be combined with an acid food, the right order is: Acid food into milk. For example, in making cream of tomato soup, the hot thickened tomato should be added gradually to the cool milk. Then the mixture is heated briefly and served immediately. Likewise in making milk sherbert with an acid fruit juice such as lemon, the fruit juice after sweetening is added gradually to the milk.

In all such mixtures the combining should be done gradually with constant stirring to avoid separation. When the mixture must be heated, the heating should be as brief as possible and at a low temperature.

Never use knives or rough scouring materials to clean glass cooking ware, household management specialists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture say. Scrubbing with a knife or scouring with steel wool may scratch the protective surface of the glass and eventually lead to a crack. Even a slight scratch may make the glass less resistant to heat.

Generally, glass cooking should not only be done in a clean place, but also in a clean manner.

Enroll For Veterans Farm Training Now

Arthurs B. Corvey, County Service Officer, announces that North Carolina veterans of World War II, who desire to take co-operative farm training under provisions of Public Law 346 (the G. I. Bill), must be enrolled for instruction by a vocational agricultural teacher prior to March 1, 1947, in order to receive tuition and subsistence allowance payments under the Veterans Administration training program.

Veterans not enrolled by the end of February cannot enter the farm training program until 1948, as new provisions require all enrollments to be made during January and February of each year in the future. This means that farm training—a co-operative program of organized instruction and actual on-farm training—will always start at the beginning of the crop year.

There are always some 8,000 veterans in the state taking farm training. They, and others entering before the new deadline, will have their progress reviewed on March 1, 1948, by their vocational agricultural teachers and VA agricultural training officers. Evidence of satisfactory progress will be required to permit continuance of subsistence allowances at that time.

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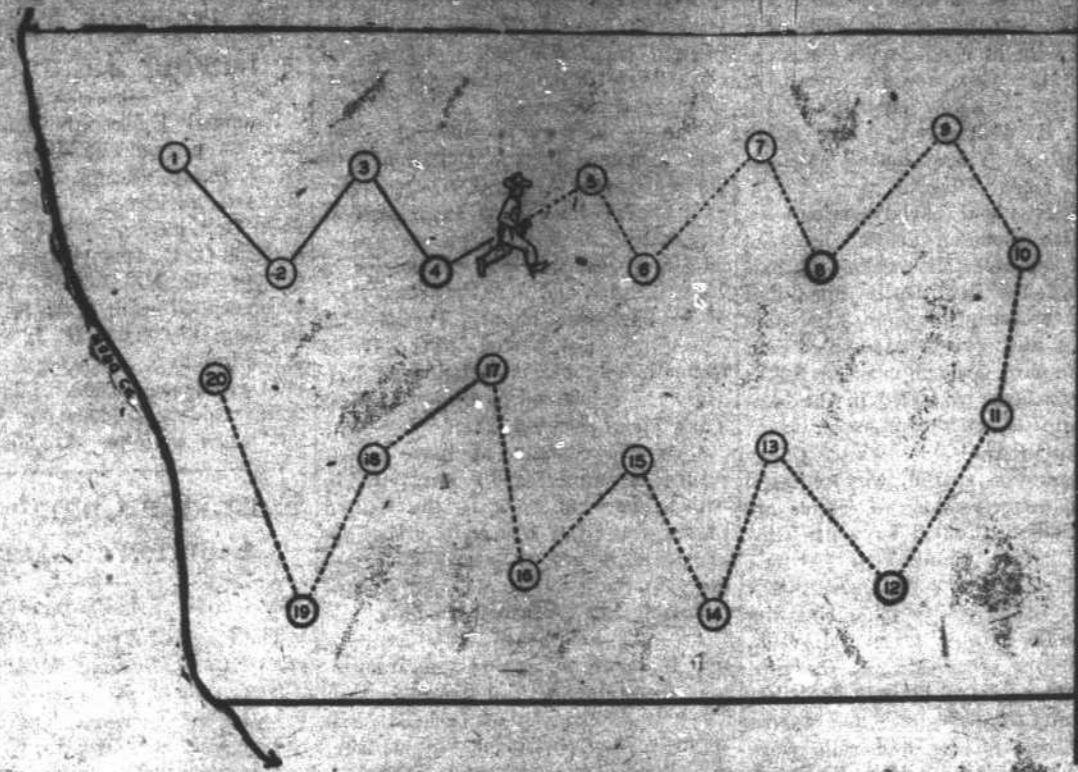
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HOW TO COLLECT SOIL SAMPLES FROM A FIVE-ACRE FIELD

Although 19,500 soil samples were analyzed by the Soil Testing Division of the N. C. Department of Agriculture during 1946, many farmers still do not know the proper procedure to follow in obtaining samples, says Dr. I. E. Miles, who is in charge of this work.

The 20 stations shown here represent areas where about one tablespoonful of soil should be taken for each area. These samples should be collected from the top five inches of ground and put into one container and labeled "topsoil."

A subsoil sample should be taken at three or four places at a depth of 12-16 inches and then put into a container and labeled "subsoil." This subsoil could be taken at stations numbered 4, 6, 15, and 19.
