DAUGHTERS OF AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Deploring the fact that music has been generally neglected in education today, Mrs. Haywood Smith brought out the need for its use more in schools because of its power to inspire students to do better, in a paper she read at the D. A. R. meeting, Saturday afternoon. Mrs. G. A. Rouse prepared the paper dealing with Youth and Music, which was a continuation of the chapter's study of all phases of youth.

Music's use in the prevention of crime can be shown by the record of the Music School Settlement in the heart of New York's East side, which in 1928 after a quarter of a century's existence had never had one of its 30,000 pupils and former students appear before a juvenile court for delinquency. Time has not changed that record. Mrs. Rouse went on to note that in a survey of 11 penal institutions only four were found to have any musically trained inmates. The program was interspersed with vocal selections by Miss Rosemary Holmes and piano numbers by Donald Baucom. Mrs. M. V. Jones was accompanist for Miss Holmes.

Reports from different committees and from the treasurer were heard in the business session presided over by Mrs. T. C. Turnage, respondent, who also urged that as many members as could attend the National Congress during the week of May 19 in Washington, D. C.
