BIRD CLUB

The Williamson Sapsucker was the topic for discussion at the meeting, Saturday morning, with Chandler Cox reading an article about this bird who builds its nest in a tree or stump usually from 5 to 60 feet above the ground.

A curious fact about the handsome male is that it is only four-toed American woodpecker which has no red feathers on the top of its head.

Returning for several successive years to the same nesting place, it makes a new evacuation each time. The male does most of the work, both of excavation and incubation. When the female is on the nest the male sits on a branch nearby and warns of danger by a special tapping.

The species is rather silent and shy and is likely to work and stay near the tops of trees eating ants and woodpeckers the latter item providing vegetable matter. The Williamson Sapsucker is of economic value in many ways.
