BIRD CLUB NOTES

Bert Warren read an article dealing with the Yellow-headed Blackbird at the Bird club Saturday morning. This bird dresses in a glossy black coat. Over its head, around the neck and down its chest, it wears a rich yellow mantle. On each shoulder is displayed a large showy epaulette of white.

Other identifying features are the bill, which is decidedly shorter than the head, the long, pointed wings, the slightly rounded tail which is over two-thirds the length of the wings, and the hard stiff feathers.

Faunston to weed stems from one to three feet above the water, the nest is woven of sedge grass and is rather compact, bulky and is lined with finer blades of grass. The Yellow-headed Blackbird lives in a large colony usually in the center of a large marsh.

When on the ground this bird walks indeed its gait is rather a pompous strut. Although it eats some oats and wheat, the destruction of many harmful beetles and insects provides most of its food.
