J. D. Joyner, register of deeds, appointed tax collector by Pitt Board of Commissioners.

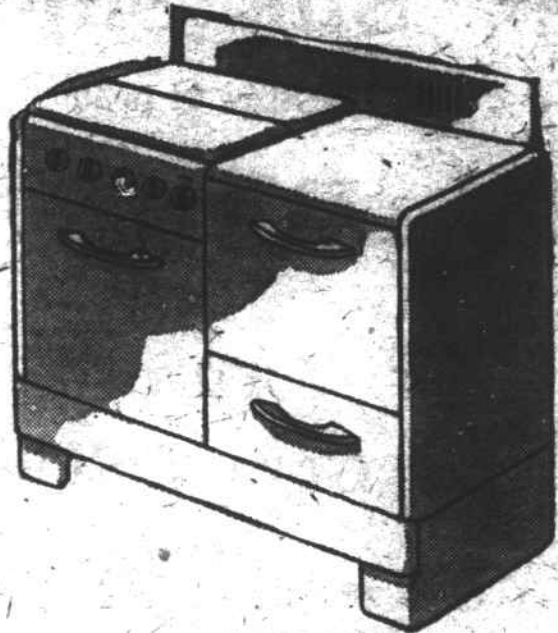
