**VITAL INITIATIVE**  
 Fort Morgan (Colorado) Times

In these times of agitation between groups on industrial matters it can be said that renewed stimulation of that spirit of initiative and self-reliance—both individual and corporate—is vital to America tomorrow on two counts: First, because popular self-government itself cannot long exist without an economically independent citizenry; second, because the rising standard of living that we seek to attain depends on increased production, and we cannot get increased production in the absence of individual and corporate initiative and efficiency, backed up by the united effort of all our economic groups.

In respect to the first point, namely, the vital importance of maintaining an economically independent citizenry: Obviously, the preservation of a representative democracy hinges directly on the willingness of the people to decide public questions on the basis of the general national welfare—not on narrow considerations of individual or group selfishness.

If citizens are not themselves economically independent but are the wards of the state, how can they avoid dealing with public questions on the basis of self-interest. Furthermore, without a financially independent citizenry, how can we hope to maintain our two-party political system? The party in power is in position to use public funds for political propaganda. Financial support for the opposition can come only from private citizens, and without intelligent opposition our republican system of government is self-defeating.

Obviously, also, private business cannot exist without constant accretions of new capital. If private citizens are not in position to furnish it, the state must supply it and when government becomes the primary source of capital funds, national socialism automatically displaces representative democracy. The church and our private educational and philanthropic institutions would be lost without the support that individual citizens can furnish them.

Thus, a self-reliant, economically

Independent citizenry plays a very vital part in popular self-government. In fact, James Madison said: "The economic foundation of the American political system is the protection of the differing and unequal capacity of men to acquire and use property."

**WEEKLY NEWS LETTER**

Hoover Taft of Greenville, who asserts that he "has a little bit harder time than anybody else convincing folks that I'm a real Democrat in spite of my name," will guide the destinies of the Young Democratic Clubs of North Carolina during the ensuing year.

Taft was elected president of the organization by acclamation Saturday afternoon at the next to final session of the 12th annual three-day convention. There were no other nominations for the office, in spite of pre-convention rumors that several others were actively seeking the post. Taft succeeds Basil L. Whitener of Gastonia, who served during the past year.

Other officers named, all by unanimous votes, were: Ida Pearl Petree of Greensboro, vice-president; H. Clifton Blue of Aberdeen, secretary; David Royster of Cleveland county, treasurer; George Fountain of Tarboro, national committeeman; and Flora Nixon Powell of Charlotte, national committeewoman.

Occupying the spotlight at the convention was Governor James E. Folsom, a 6 foot 8 inch, 38-year-old giant of a man, whose homely manner of speaking captivated his large audience assembled at a banquet in the ballroom of the Sir Walter Hotel for the final session.

Declaring that present day youth are showing great interest in government, Folsom said they must bear the torch of leadership. He said that proof of his belief in young people is the fact that the ages of members of his "cabinet" range from 28 to 35 years, with one exception.

Folsom attacked large interests of certain types, calling them predatory parasites preying on the laboring man. At the same time, he advocated greater industrialization of the
