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355 AUTOMOTIVE VEHICLES
TO BE SOLD AT LEJUNE, 29-30

In an effort to dispose of all automotive vehicles currently in its inventory in North Carolina, the War Assets Administration will offer over \$1,000,000 worth of such vehicles located at 15 different sites in North Carolina in a competitive bid sale to be staged at Camp Lejeune for eligible priority and non-priority buyers on October 29 and 30.

The property, which consists of over 355 vehicles of various types will be sold on an equal basis to veterans for use in their own small business, professional or agricultural enterprise (veterans will be required to sign a statement concerning ownership and purpose of purchase and that they are not purchasing for resale) and eligible non-priority buyers which include automotive dealers, franchised bus operators, or exporters. Since these vehicles have been previously offered to veterans, they will not be sold to those veterans desiring to purchase for their own use.

The sale will open noon October 29 and close at the close of business on October 30. Inspection of the property may be made from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. on October 29, 27, 28, and until noon October 29, by contacting the Surplus Property Officer or Custodian at the property locations listed in catalogues, WAA officials said. Catalogues are available at the three WAA Customer Service Centers — Charlotte, Wilmington and Greensboro. The property will be sold on an "As Is—Where Is" basis, in its present condition at the location, with no warranty as to condition, with no recourse against the Government. Bids will be accepted and awards made daily on days of sale.

Cotton Carry-Over
Higher In Grade

The carry-over of cotton on Aug. 1, 1947, was considerably higher in grade and longer in staple length than the carry-over a year earlier, according to a report just released by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The improvement in the quality of this year's carry-over is due to several factors, among which are: (1) The almost complete disposal of all Government-owned and controlled stocks, a large portion of which were of the lower grades and shorter lengths, (2) the relatively high quality of last year's small crop, and (3) increased plantings during recent years of the varieties of cotton which ordinarily produce the medium staple lengths.

The carry-over of cotton in the United States on August 1, 1947, was the smallest since 1929. Total carry-over as of August 1 was 2,382,000 bales, as compared with 7,326,000 in 1946 and the 10-year (1935-44) average carry-over of 9,646,000 bales.

SEVERAL NAVY SHIPS WILL
VISIT SOUTHERN PORTS

The Navy Department has announced that ships will visit Charleston, S. C., Wilmington, and Savannah, Ga., during Navy Day Week, and that in most cases these ships will be open to visitors from October 25 to October 28.

Ships have been assigned to areas in which they normally would be operating.

The destroyer USS Gyatt is scheduled to be at Wilmington; the destroyer minesweeper USS Shannon at Savannah; and at Charleston, the destroyer USS Anson, the patrol craft, the PC 582, and four minicraft: the Hambleton, Pennington, Wheaton, and Crackie.

Memorial services for members of the armed forces who lost their lives at sea will be also held in Charleston and Wilmington, on Sunday, October 26. The services which have been designated by the Navy League, sponsors of Navy Day as a memorial and tribute to those in all the services who lost their lives at sea and

in the air over the seas will be conducted by Navy chaplains, and flowers memorializing those who lost their lives will be taken to sea and strewn on the ocean.

All residents of North Carolina who desire to send flowers for the ceremonies should address them to the District Chaplain, Headquarters Naval District, Naval Base, S. C.; or to the District Representative for Naval Reserve, Custom House Building, Wilmington. It is suggested that only one flower, either wild or home grown be sent.

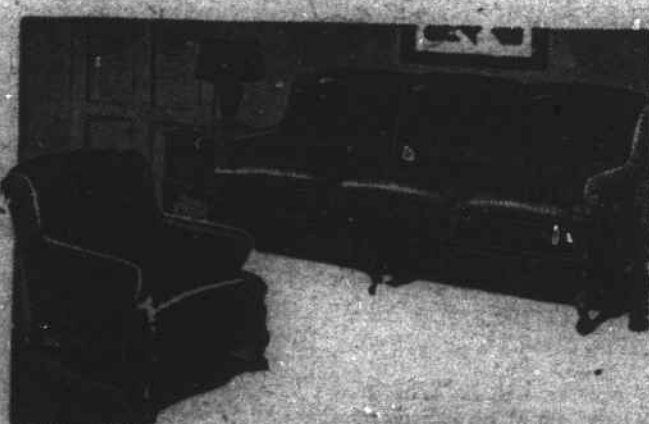
