\$155,000
TOWN OF FARMVILLE, NORTH CAROLINA
ELECTRIC LIGHT SYSTEM BONDS

Sealed bids will be received until 11 o'clock a. m. EST, November 25, 1947, by the undersigned at its office in the City of Raleigh, N. C., for \$155,000 Electric Light System Bonds of the Town of Farmville, North Carolina, dated December 1, 1947, and maturing annually on June 1, \$4,000 1950 to 1953; \$5,000 1954 to 1957 and \$10,000 1958 to 1975, inclusive, without option of prior payment. There will be no auction. Denomination \$1,000; principal and semiannual (J & D 1) interest payable in lawful money in New York City; coupon bonds registrable as to principal only; general obligations; unlimited tax; delivery at place of purchaser's choice.

Bidders are requested to name the interest rate or rates, not exceeding six per cent per annum in multiples of one-fourth of one per cent. Each bid may name one rate for part of the bonds and another rate or rates for the balance, but no bid may name more than four rates, and each bidder must specify in his bid the amount of bonds of each rate. Each rate must be bid for bonds of consecutive maturities. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder offering to purchase the bonds at the lowest interest cost to the Town, such cost to be determined by deducting the total amount of the premium bid from the aggregate amount of interest upon all of the bonds until their respective maturities. No bid of less than par and accrued interest will be entertained.

Bids must be enclosed in a sealed envelope marked "Proposal for Bonds" and must be accompanied by a certified check upon an incorporated bank or trust company, payable unconditionally to the order of the State Treasurer of North Carolina for \$3,720. The right to reject all bids is reserved. The approving opinion of Messrs. Reed, Hoyt & Washburn, New York City, will be furnished the purchaser.


