Pumpkin Pie

Broadcast: November 22, 1947

1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup molasses
1/2 cup cornmeal
1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup pumpkin
1/2 cup eggs
1/2 cup salt
1/2 cup cinnamon
1/2 cup nutmeg
1/2 cup ginger
1/2 cup cloves
1/2 cup allspice
1/2 cup cloves
1/2 cup nutmeg
1/2 cup ginger
1/2 cup cloves
1/2 cup allspice

Turn on oven; set at very hot (450° F.). Mix together brown sugar, flour, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger and cloves. Add remaining ingredients; stir until smooth. Pour into deep 9-inch pie pan lined with unbleached pastry. Bake 15 min.; then reduce heat to slow (325° F.) and bake 40 min., or until firm.

Note: 2 1/2 tablesp. pumpkin pie spice can replace the above spices.

For Sweet Potato Pie, substitute for the pumpkin freshly cooked or canned sweet potatoes or yams, put through a sieve, reduce brown sugar to 1/2 cup, omit molasses and add 2 tablesp. melted butter or margarine.

For Squash Pie, follow recipe for Pumpkin Pie, substituting cooked winter squash, thoroughly washed, for the pumpkin.
