CARRAWAY'S CIRCLE

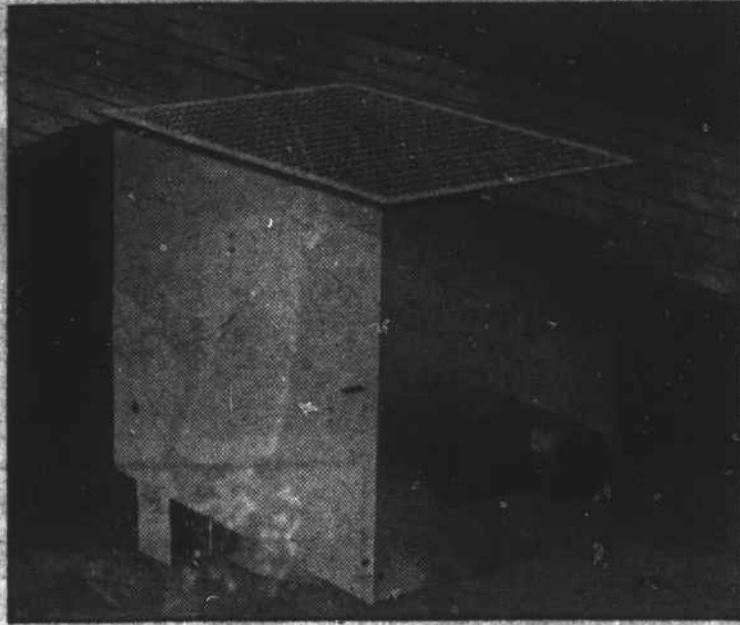
Mrs. Noah Bundy and Mrs. James Walston were hostesses to the Carraway Circle Saturday afternoon at the home of the former.
