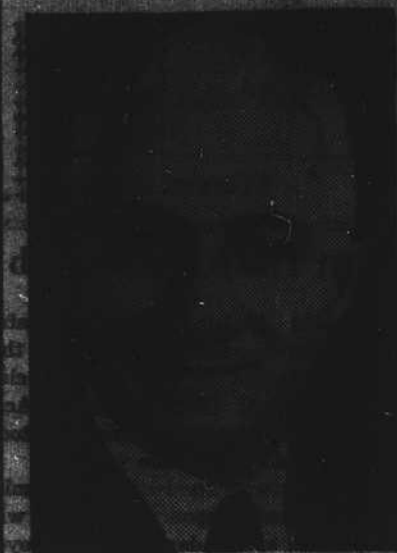


Utilities Man Heads Kiwanis International

Delegates attending the 56th annual convention of Kiwanis International at St. Louis elected a prominent public utilities executive to head the organization in the year ahead.

Frank Allen, a former president of the local club and a candidate for lieutenant governor of the division, and Mrs. Allen attended the convention.

Claude E. Hellman, lighting department manager of the Consolidated Gas, Electric Light and Power Company of Baltimore, succeeded Don H. Murdoch of Winnipeg, Manitoba, as president of Kiwanis International, which now is comprised of 8,500 clubs throughout the United States, Canada, Alaska, Hawaii, and the Yukon Territory.
